INTERNATIONAL FINANCIAL REPORTING STANDARDS

The 2026 and 2025 information set forth in this document should be read in conjunction with the condensed consolidated unaudited interim financial statements and related notes, prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("**IFRS**") as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board, for the six-month periods ended June 30, 2026 and 2025.

PRESENTATION CURRENCY

The condensed consolidated interim financial statements are presented in United States Dollars ("U.S. Dollars"), unless otherwise specified. The functional currency of Freegold Limited (formerly Freegold Ventures Limited) ("**Freegold**" or the "**Company**") is Canadian Dollars ("**Cdn\$**"). However, the functional currency of the Company's foreign subsidiaries is the U.S. Dollar. Accordingly, the condensed consolidated financial statements are presented in U.S. Dollars. Unless otherwise noted, all currency amounts presented in this MD&A are stated in U.S. Dollars.

BUSINESS OF FREEGOLD

Freegold is an exploration-stage company engaged in the acquisition, exploration and evaluation of mineral properties of merit with the aim of developing them to a stage where they can be exploited at a profit or to arrange joint ventures whereby other companies provide funding for development and exploitation or outright purchase. The Company was incorporated in 1985 and is listed on the Toronto Stock Exchange under the symbol "FVL" and on the OTCQX Best Market, the top tier of the OTC Markets in the U.S. under the symbol "FGOVF". As of August 13, 2026, the Company had 577,819,843 shares outstanding. The Company has its registered corporate office in Vancouver, Canada.

CORPORATE UPDATE

On July 6, 2026, the Company changed its name from “Freegold Ventures Limited” to “Freegold Limited.”

On April 13, 2026, the Company announced the appointments of Maureen Marks as Vice President, Engineering, and Paul Jago as Exploration Manager, expanding its technical leadership team as the Golden Summit Project advances through a pre-feasibility study (“PFS”).

REVIEW OF EXPLORATION PROJECTS

The Company continues to focus its exploration activities in Alaska on its Golden Summit Project (as defined herein).

GOLDEN SUMMIT PROJECT

The Golden Summit Project (the “**Golden Summit Project**” or the “**Project**”) is a road-accessible gold exploration project near Fairbanks, Alaska. The Project comprises several long-term leases (“**Keystone Claims**”, “**Newsboy Claims**”, “**Green Claims**”, and “**Alaska Mental Health Trust Property**”), as well as claims and lands owned by Freegold or subject to a purchase agreement by Freegold.

The Project is subject to various fixed and sliding net smelter return royalties NSR's ranging from 1% to 4.5%, depending on the price of gold. The Project is also subject to various payments and annual work commitments.

Freegold has intermittently explored the Project since 1992. Exploration activities have included ground and airborne geophysics, rock, soil and trench sampling, and drilling (reverse circulation, rotary air blast, and core). The Project hosts several high-grade historical gold mines and significant historical placer gold production. It is estimated that approximately 6.75 million ounces of placer gold have been recovered from the streams that drain the Golden Summit Project area.

Today's Golden Summit story began in 2019, when Freegold shifted its interpretation of the Project from broad wide spread low-grade mineralization associated with the Dolphin stock to a system that could also host structurally controlled, higher-grade gold zones within a much larger mineralized envelope. This revised geological model made the search for higher-grade potential the central driver of the Company's renewed exploration strategy. Rather than treating historical production and widespread mineralization as isolated features, the 2019 work began to outline a coherent framework for testing whether higher-grade corridors could be identified, extended, and ultimately incorporated into a larger resource development scenario.

That 2019 shift set up the renewed drilling programs that have followed since 2020, when Freegold began testing whether higher-grade mineralization could be traced through the Dolphin-Cleary system and adjacent zones. Since then, each campaign has added to the development case: confirming higher-grade potential, expanding and classifying the resource, and building the technical foundation for a PFS.

The 2023 program was designed to delineate Cleary-Dolphin mineralization up dip to the north, step out west of Cleary-Dolphin Zone to test the potential for near-surface higher-grade gold mineralization in the WOW Zone, and conduct reconnaissance drilling at the Saddle Zone, located approximately 4 kilometres (“km”) east of the Dolphin-Cleary resource. Between March and November 2023, the Company completed approximately 26,000 metres of drilling in 44 holes. Drilling completed at and west of the Cleary-Dolphin Zone was subsequently incorporated into the updated mineral resource estimate released in September 2024.

During 2024, the Company completed 41 drill holes totaling 25,708 metres. The drilling continued to support the potential for higher-grade mineralization in both the Dolphin-Cleary and WOW Zones, while also reinforcing the opportunity for continued resource growth through additional drilling, particularly in the Dolphin and Cleary areas. In this respect, the 2024 program built on 2023 results by both confirming the importance of the central resource area and extending the technical basis for continued evaluation of adjacent mineralized trends.

A significant component of the 2024 program was the collection of large-diameter PQ core to support metallurgical testwork across multiple parts of the Project. These holes were distributed to provide representative material from key mineralized areas including one in the Cleary Zone, one on the northern flank of the Dolphin Zone, one on the southern flank of the Dolphin Zone, and one west of Willow Creek in the WOW Zone. Samples from this work were submitted to BaseMet's facility in Kamloops, British Columbia, where they have been used to support ongoing metallurgical evaluation. The same program also included infill drilling and westward expansion drilling designed to test a large gold-in-soil anomaly coincident with the WOW Zone, further linking exploration drilling with the broader objective of defining the Project's most prospective and potentially higher-grade corridors.

The 2024 work program also expanded beyond drilling. Baseline environmental studies, archaeological assessments, cultural resource work, and wetland delineation were undertaken during the year, establishing datasets intended to support future permitting and project-planning requirements. These activities are expected to continue and form part of the Company's longer-term effort to advance Golden Summit.

The Company also strengthened its land position in 2024. On February 22, 2024, it announced that it had exercised its right to purchase the state and federal mining claims previously subject to a 20-year lease on the Tolovana Gold Property for US\$655,260. A third party had originally leased the Tolovana Gold Property and later assigned the lease to Freegold, which assumed the seller's obligations, including annual lease payments. Because the property had been subject to a sliding-scale net smelter return royalty under the lease, the purchase eliminated that royalty burden and consolidated the Company's control over an important component of the Golden Summit land package.

The momentum established through the 2023 and 2024 programs continued into 2025, when the Company published an updated mineral resource estimate ("MRE") for the Golden Summit Project. Released in July 2025, the 2025 MRE incorporated the results of the 2024 drilling program and reflected updated metallurgical recovery assumptions. The estimate showed meaningful growth in the primary mineral resource, including a material increase in indicated contained ounces and a higher indicated grade relative to the 2024 MRE, while maintaining the same primary cut-off grade of 0.50 grams/tonne ("g/t") gold ("Au").

Within the primary mineral resource, the indicated category increased to 17.2 million ounces ("Moz") at 1.24 g/t Au, representing a 42% increase in contained ounces and a 15% increase in grade compared with the 2024 MRE. The inferred primary mineral resource increased to 11.9 Moz at 1.04 g/t Au, representing an 11% increase in contained ounces at the same grade. These changes underscored the importance of the 2024 drilling program and provided a stronger resource base for ongoing project evaluation.

The 2025 MRE also incorporated updated metallurgical assumptions. It used a recovery rate of 92%, representing the average of the three sulfide oxidation methods assessed to date, and applied a three-year trailing gold price of US\$2,490/oz. Processing costs were increased from US\$14/tonne ("t") in the 2024 MRE, which assumed 72% recovery, to US\$25/t in the 2025 MRE to account for the oxidation processing required to achieve the higher recovery assumption. Ongoing metallurgical work is intended to determine the most effective oxidation method for the deposit and to optimize the combination of gravity, flotation, and CIL techniques that may ultimately define the Project flowsheet.

2025 was also a significant drilling year. The Company completed more than 39,000 metres of drilling in 63 holes, with the infill program designed to improve the resource block model and refine geological interpretation in areas relevant to the planned PFS for Golden Summit. Because the deposit is geologically complex, additional drilling and modelling are required to better define the higher-grade corridors that may influence the initial pit, strip ratio, and future cut-off grade selection.

This year, Golden Summit has moved into a more technical stage focused on advancing the work required for a planned PFS. The PFS should be understood as an important preliminary milestone rather than a final development decision. It is intended to narrow development options, organize the key technical workstreams, and identify the additional drilling, engineering, permitting, financing, and feasibility-level work that will still be required.

Drilling resumed in February 2026 with a planned 50,000-metre program focused on the Dolphin, Cleary, WOW, and Tamarack Zones. Because the deposit is geologically complex, the program is infill and technical in nature rather than simply resource-expansion drilling. Its purpose is to refine geological continuity, better define higher-grade corridors within the broader mineralized system, test the approximately 400 m gap between Tamarack and Cleary Hill, and build a solid, internally consistent geological model to support pit studies and the targeted 2027 PFS.

Freegold's current exploration and development program aligns closely with the technical steps required to advance a mineral project to a PFS. A central requirement is a current Mineral Resource Estimate supported by sufficient drill density, clear geological domains, and a well-validated block model. Freegold is addressing this through its 2026 drill program of approximately 50,000 m, which builds on more than 170,000 m of drilling completed since 2020. With six rigs operating, the program is designed to improve grade continuity in the Dolphin, Cleary, and WOW zones and further evaluate the Tamarack Zone and the Cleary gap.

The next major PFS requirement is geotechnical characterization sufficient to support pit slope design. This includes field investigations, core drilling, laboratory testing, structural interpretation, and the development of bench, inter-ramp, and overall slope recommendations for the ultimate pit design. Freegold's current geotechnical program directly supports this requirement through additional vibrating wire piezometer installations, in situ strength testing, geotechnical core logging, and sample collection. These activities are designed to build on the 2025 monitoring network and provide the rock mass data needed for pit wall stability assessment. Accordingly, six holes are currently being drilled to support this work.

Hydrogeological and hydrological studies are also required for a PFS because they define groundwater inflows, support dewatering design, inform pit stability, and provide the basis for site-wide water management. Freegold is progressing this work through monitoring installation, baseline groundwater data collection, and preliminary groundwater flow modelling. These studies will need to feed into the broader PFS requirements for a site water balance, surface water management strategy, design flood estimates, tailings storage water requirements, and dewatering planning.

Another central PFS component is the development of a preliminary pit. This work requires integrating the resource model, geotechnical constraints, metal pricing, operating costs and cut-off grade assumptions.

Metallurgical testwork and process flowsheet selection are required to establish process design criteria, recovery assumptions, reagent and energy consumption estimates, and equipment sizing inputs. Freegold's current metallurgical program is not intended to over-study the deposit, but to evaluate Golden Summit given its size, geological variability, material types, depths, and mineralized zones. The program is designed to support the selection of a preferred flowsheet and builds on prior pilot plant testing using a 50 kilogram concentrate sample to assess processing alternatives.

Additional samples from the 2025 and 2026 drill programs are expected to further refine recovery expectations and processing assumptions for the PFS.

Environmental baseline studies are required to advance project development permitting. Freegold is addressing this requirement through ongoing baseline studies covering avian and wildlife habitat, wetlands, cultural resources, archaeology, and paleontology. This work provides an important foundation for the preliminary environmental and permitting strategy needed for the PFS.

Engineering design, infrastructure planning, and capital and operating cost estimation will need to be developed from the mine plan, process flowsheet, equipment requirements, site infrastructure needs, sustaining capital assumptions, and closure and reclamation costs. Freegold's current work on pit optimization, metallurgical testwork, hydrogeology, geotechnical investigations, and environmental baseline studies provide key inputs for these estimates, but the PFS will still need to consolidate them into formal process plant layouts, tailings storage design, water management structures, power supply, access roads, and PFS-level cost estimates.

The final PFS step will be to integrate these technical workstreams into a financial model and risk framework. This will require defining project economics, including net present value, internal rate of return, payback period, and sensitivities to metal prices, grade, capital costs, and operating costs. It will also require documenting key trade-off decisions, such as mining approach, flowsheet selection, throughput rate, and phased versus full-scale development, while identifying remaining data gaps to be addressed in a future feasibility study if warranted.

To fund this work, the Company completed a Cdn\$50 million equity financing in January 2026 with participation from institutional investors, including Eric Sprott. The financing supports the drilling,

metallurgical, geotechnical, environmental, and engineering programs required to advance Golden Summit toward the planned PFS milestone.

Accordingly, the remaining work is significant. The Company is expected to continue to refine the resource model, conduct additional metallurgical work to define a preferred processing approach, integrate geotechnical information into pit design assumptions, and baseline environmental data into permitting support. These workstreams will form the basis of the PFS while also defining what additional work will be required in later stages.

The table below summarizes the Company's significant business objective and the near-term steps required to advance the Project toward that preliminary PFS milestone.

Exploration Upside and District-Scale Potential

The Golden Summit Project is in an area with a long history of production. Since the Alaskan gold rush, more than 6.75 Moz of placer gold have reportedly been recovered from streams draining the Project area, and a further approximately 500,000 oz of lode gold have been produced. The current mineral resource is located within the western portion of the approximately 13 km by 6 km property, within a footprint of approximately 2 km by 1.5 km. Management believes there remains exploration potential both east and west of the currently defined resource, including continued follow-up of the Tamarack Zone announced in January 2026.

To the east, geochemical and geophysical surveys have identified target areas, including gold-in-soil anomalies that management considers prospective. The Company's evolving understanding of mineralization controls has contributed to what management describes as an industry-competitive discovery cost of under \$5/oz. One drill rig is planned to be allocated to the eastern area during the summer to test priority targets and assess the potential for additional discoveries that could contribute to project scale.

Outlook and Path to Pre-Feasibility Study

In January 2026, the Company completed a Cdn\$50 million equity financing with participation from institutional investors, including Eric Sprott. The financing is intended to support the Company's planned 2026 programs.

Management's principal 2026 initiatives at the Golden Summit Project are expected to include the following:

- **Infill drilling** to further define higher-grade corridors and support the mineral resource model;
- **Expanded metallurgical testing** to support flowsheet selection and recovery optimization;
- **Evaluation of multiple development strategies**, including staged development, as part of the PFS process; and
- **Completion of a PFS in 2027.**

With drilling having resumed in February 2026, management expects 2026 to be an active year, including infill, condemnation, and exploration drilling, along with ongoing environmental baseline programs intended to support future permitting activities. These workstreams are expected to provide technical inputs for the PFS targeted for 2027.

The Company has conducted baseline studies over several years, including groundwater work and wetlands delineation, and has undertaken reclamation of drill pads and access routes following use. Management considers these activities important to minimize environmental impacts and support future permitting requirements.

In 2025, the Company expanded field assessments to include cultural resources, archaeology, and paleontology. As part of its environmental initiatives, the Company installed vibrating wire piezometers ("VWPs") to support ongoing groundwater monitoring, which may inform future dewatering strategies. Mammal habitat assessments were initiated during the winter, with plans to expand seasonal coverage. The Company is also advancing plans to electrify the Golden Summit Project camp as part of a strategy to reduce diesel consumption, with completion anticipated in the 3rd quarter 2026. As part of its PFS planning, the Company has engaged a power consultant to evaluate local power infrastructure and assess alternative energy sources.

Management believes the Golden Summit Project's scale, location, and ongoing technical work (including metallurgical testwork) provide flexibility to evaluate multiple development pathways. Alternatives, including potential staged development concepts, are expected to be assessed as part of the PFS process to support selection of an optimal approach to development and production.

SHORTY CREEK

By agreement dated July 17, 2014, the Company entered into a renewable lease agreement with an initial term expiring December 31, 2024, subsequently extended to June 30, 2025. The lease agreement includes mineral claims known as the Shorty Creek Property and is located northwest of Fairbanks, Alaska. On August 8, 2014, the Company issued 750,000 common shares of the Company ("**Common Shares**") as consideration for entering into the lease agreement. The vendor will retain a 2% NSR. The Company is responsible for ongoing annual assessment work as required by the State of Alaska. In 2014 and 2016, additional claims were staked within and outside the area of interest and the Company will be responsible for these annual State of Alaska rents. On November 20, 2025, the Company reported it was unable to reach an agreement on suitable commercial terms and the lease has therefore been terminated. The Company wrote-down all the exploration expenditures of \$6,558,160 in 2025 and \$21,867 for the period ended June 30, 2026.

The Company staked several additional claims outside of the area of influence of the Shorty Creek agreement on which it maintains 100% ownership. This property is now known as Quarry Hill Copper and consists of 27 claims.

The scientific and technical disclosure contained in this MD&A has been reviewed and approved by Alvin Jackson, P.Geo., Vice President Exploration and Development for the Company, who is a "Qualified Person" as defined under National Instrument 43-101 – *Standards of Disclosure for Mineral Projects*.

RESULTS OF OPERATIONS

Six-month period ended June 30, 2026

The Company's net comprehensive loss for the six-month period ended June 30, 2026 was \$1,946,143 compared to a net comprehensive profit of \$484,630 for the six-month period ended June 30, 2025. A \$1,560,760 foreign currency translation adjustment loss (June 30, 2025 – gain \$1,080,649) was recognized due to the fluctuating foreign exchange rates between the U.S. and Canadian dollar as the Company's Canadian dollar amounts decreased in value during the current six-month period.

General and administrative expenses increased \$227,794 from \$739,220 in 2025 to \$967,014 in 2026 with the changes mainly attributable to:

- an increase of \$17,654 in consulting fees from \$8,875 in 2025 to \$26,529 in 2026 as a compensation specialist was engaged in the current period to compare Company compensation to industry standard;
- an increase of \$94,548 in professional fees from \$53,273 in 2025 to \$147,821 in 2026 as higher fees were paid in the current period due to increased legal fees associated with regulatory filing requirements;
- an increase of \$53,962 in filing fees from \$137,247 in 2025 to \$191,209 in 2026 due to the increase in share capital value;
- an increase of \$116,338 in travel costs from \$36,268 in 2025 to \$152,606 in 2026 as higher costs were incurred in the current period as trips were made to various investment conferences; and
- a decrease of \$36,584 in wages from \$284,007 in 2025 to \$247,423 in 2026 due to foreign exchange as the Canadian dollar devalued compared to the US dollar and wages are paid in Canadian funds.

All other general and administrative costs were relatively similar to those incurred in the previous year.

Other items changed from a gain of \$143,201 in 2025 to a gain of \$581,631 in 2026 with the changes mainly attributable to:

- an increase of \$278,081 in interest income, from \$205,172 in 2025 to \$483,253 in 2026, due to increased amounts of cash on deposit.

During the six-month period ended June 30, 2026, the Company incurred acquisition, and exploration and evaluation property expenditures as outlined below:

The increase in cash of \$23,504,391 for the six-month period ended June 30, 2026 was mainly attributable to net proceeds of share capital issued of \$36,732,331 offset by \$10,956,772 in mineral exploration and acquisition costs. This compares to an increase in cash of \$29,494,926 for the six-month period ended June 30, 2025 that was mainly attributable to net proceeds of share capital issued of \$32,438,482 offset by mineral exploration and acquisition costs of \$3,361,467.

Three-month period ended June 30, 2026

The Company's net comprehensive loss for the three-month period ended June 30, 2026 was \$1,035,844 compared to a net comprehensive profit of \$617,619 for the three-month period ended June 30, 2025. A \$865,279 foreign currency translation adjustment loss (June 30, 2025 – gain \$1,083,473) was recognized due to the fluctuating foreign exchange rates between the U.S. and Canadian dollar as the Company's Canadian dollar amounts decreased in value during the current three-month period.

General and administrative expenses increased \$101,543 from \$389,185 in 2025 to \$490,728 in 2026 with the changes mainly attributable to:

- an increase of \$15,649 in consulting fees from \$5,411 in 2025 to \$21,060 in 2026 as a compensation specialist was engaged in the current period to compare Company compensation to industry standard;
- an increase of \$49,701 in professional fees from \$38,436 in 2025 to \$88,137 in 2026 as higher fees were paid in the current period due to increased legal fees associated with regulatory filing requirements;
- an increase of \$14,349 in promotion and shareholder relations from \$57,252 in 2025 to \$71,601 in 2026 due to attendance at trade shows and additional investor awareness initiatives;
- an increase of \$85,075 in travel costs from \$19,859 in 2025 to \$104,934 in 2026 as higher costs were incurred in the current period as trips were made to various investment conferences; and
- a decrease of \$57,148 in wages from \$179,548 in 2025 to \$122,400 in 2026 due to foreign exchange as the Canadian dollar devalued compared to the US dollar and wages are paid in Canadian funds.

All other general and administrative costs were relatively similar to those incurred in the previous year.

Other items changed from a gain of \$123,331 in 2025 to a gain of \$320,163 in 2026 with the changes mainly attributable to:

- an increase of \$64,303 in interest income, from \$184,066 in 2025 to \$248,369 in 2026, due to increased amounts of cash on deposit.

The Company's exploration expenses historically tend to be lower during winter months as much of the field exploration is carried out during the summer season; however, as drilling recommenced in February this year, exploration costs are expected to remain reasonably constant throughout 2026.

Liquidity and Capital Resources

As at June 30, 2026, the Company's working capital, defined as current assets less current liabilities, was \$40,012,955 compared to \$18,458,397 as at December 31, 2025. The Company has current liabilities of \$2,744,584 of which \$2,706,874 relates to trade payables, \$26,602 relates to accrued liabilities and \$11,108 relates to the current portion of the office lease liability.

The Company had cash and cash equivalents of \$42,384,571 as at June 30, 2026, compared to \$18,880,180 as at December 31, 2025. The increase in cash of \$23,504,391 for the six-month period ended June 30, 2026 was mainly attributable to net proceeds of share capital issued of \$36,732,331 offset by \$10,956,772 in mineral exploration and acquisition costs. This compares to an increase in cash of \$29,494,926 for the six-month period ended June 30, 2025 that was mainly attributable to net proceeds of share capital issued of \$32,438,482 offset by mineral exploration and acquisition costs of \$3,361,467.

The Company has no operating revenues other than interest income and therefore must utilize its funds from financing transactions to maintain its capacity to meet ongoing operating activities.

During the six-month period ended June 30, 2026, the Company closed a brokered private placement financing (the "2026 Offering"), for total proceeds of Cdn\$49,999,950 through the sale of 38,461,500 Common Shares of the Company at a price of Cdn\$1.30 per Common Share. The net proceeds from the 2026 Offering will be used to support the completion of the Pre-Feasibility Study for the Golden Summit Project, to support ongoing exploration, and for general corporate and working capital purposes.

During the six-month period ended June 30, 2026, 4,468,750 Warrants at Cdn\$0.52 were exercised for proceeds of Cdn\$2,323,750, 1,426,250 Warrants at Cdn\$0.4307 were exercised for proceeds of Cdn\$614,286 and 500,000 Warrants at Cdn\$1.30 were exercised for proceeds of Cdn\$650,000.

As of August 13, 2026, based on current projections, the Company's working capital is sufficient to meet its planned business objectives for the next 12 months. However, there is no guarantee that the Company will be able to maintain sufficient working capital in the future due to market, economic and commodity price fluctuations. See *"Risks and Uncertainties"*.

Trends and Economic Conditions

Management regularly monitors economic financial market conditions and estimates their impact on the Company's operations and incorporates these estimates in both short-term operating and longer-term strategic decisions. To date, the Company has been able to raise sufficient capital to fund exploration programs on the Project. The global economy is currently characterized by increased volatility and uncertainty largely due to the war in the Middle East.

Apart from these factors and the risk factors noted under the headings *"Risks and Uncertainties"* and *"Contractual Commitments"*, management is not aware of any other trends, commitments, events or uncertainties that would have a material effect on the Company's business, financial condition or results of operations.

Significant Accounting Judgments, Estimates and Assumptions

The most significant accounts that require estimates and judgements as the basis for determining the stated amounts include the recoverability of exploration and evaluation assets, determination of functional currency, valuation of share-based compensation and recognition of deferred tax amounts.

Critical judgments exercised in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognized in the condensed consolidated interim financial statements are as follows:

Economic recoverability and probability of future economic benefits of exploration and evaluation assets

Management has determined that exploration, evaluation, and related costs incurred which were capitalized may have future economic benefits and may be economically recoverable. Management uses several criteria in its assessments of economic recoverability and probability of future economic benefits including, geologic and other technical information, a history of conversion of mineral deposits with similar characteristics to its own properties to proven and probable mineral reserves, the quality and capacity of existing infrastructure facilities, evaluation of permitting and environmental issues and local support for the Project.

Determination of functional currency

The Company determines the functional currency through an analysis of several indicators such as expenses and cash flow, financing activities, retention of operating cash flows, and frequency of transactions within the reporting entity.

Going concern of operations

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, which assumes that the Company will be able to realize its assets and discharge its liabilities in the normal course of business for the foreseeable future. The assessment of the Company's ability to source future operations and continue as a going concern involves judgement. Estimates and assumptions are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. If the going concern assumption is not appropriate for the financial statements, then adjustments would be necessary in the carrying value of assets and liabilities, the reported revenue and expenses and the statement of financial position classifications used (Note 1).

Information about assumptions and estimation uncertainties that have a significant risk of resulting in material adjustments are as follows:

Valuation of share-based compensation

The Company uses the Black-Scholes option pricing model for valuation of share-based compensation. Option pricing models require the input of subjective assumptions including expected price volatility, risk-free interest rate, and forfeiture rate. Changes in the input assumptions can materially affect the fair value estimate and the Company's earnings and equity reserves.

Income taxes

In assessing the probability of realizing income tax assets, management makes estimates related to expectation of future taxable income, applicable tax opportunities, expected timing of reversals

of existing temporary differences and the likelihood that tax positions taken will be sustained upon examination by applicable tax authorities. In making its assessments, management gives additional weight to positive and negative evidence that can be objectively verified.

Determination of whether a set of assets acquired and liabilities assumed constitute a business may require the Company to make certain judgments, taking into account all facts and circumstances. A business is presumed to be an integrated set of activities and assets capable of being conducted and managed for the purpose of providing a return in the form of dividends, lower costs or economic benefits. The transaction with Alaska Mining & Development Co., Inc. was determined to constitute an acquisition of assets.

A detailed summary of all of the Company's significant accounting policies is included in Note 2 to the condensed consolidated interim financial statements for the six-month period ended June 30, 2026.

Going Concern Assumption

The recoverability of amounts shown for exploration and evaluation properties and related exploration and development expenditures is dependent upon the economic viability of recoverable reserves, the Company's ability to obtain the necessary permits and financing to complete the development, and future profitable production or proceeds from the disposition thereof.

Currently, the Company has interest income but is dependent on equity financing to fund the majority of its activities. The Company has positive working capital as at June 30, 2026 and the Company endeavors to manage the cash position prudently through ongoing monitoring of current and future cash and working capital balances relative to planned activities. The current working capital is expected to be sufficient to fund the Company's planned activities for the next twelve months.

Interests in Mining Properties and Exploration and Development Expenditures

In accordance with the Company's accounting policies, acquisition costs and exploration expenditures relating to exploration and evaluation properties are capitalized until the properties are brought into commercial production or disposed. Amortization will commence when a property is put into commercial production. As the Company does not currently have any properties in commercial production, no amortization has been recorded.

Mineral reserve and mineral resource estimates are not precise and depend on statistical inferences drawn from drilling and other data, which may prove to be unreliable. Future production could differ from mineral resource estimates for the following reasons:

- mineralization could be different from those predicted by drilling, sampling and similar tests;
- the grade of mineral resources may vary from time to time and there can be no assurance that any particular level of recovery can be achieved from the mineral resources; and
- declines in the market prices of contained minerals may render the mining of some or all of the Company's mineral resources uneconomic.

Any of these factors may result in impairment of the carrying amount of interests in mining properties or exploration and development expenditures.

Share-Based Payments, Warrants and Compensation Options

Directors, officers, employees and contractors are granted options to purchase Common Shares under the Company's Stock Option Plan. This plan and its terms and outstanding balance are disclosed in Note 8(c) to the condensed consolidated interim financial statements for the six-month period ended June 30, 2026.

The Company records an expense for option awards using the fair value method of accounting. The Company also records the fair value of warrants granted through private offerings or in lieu of fees and compensation options granted using a fair-value estimate. Management estimates the fair value of stock options, warrants granted through private offerings or in lieu of fees, and compensation options using the Black-Scholes Option Pricing Model. The Black-Scholes Option Pricing Model, used by the Company to calculate fair values, as well as other accepted option valuation models, was developed to estimate fair value of freely tradable, fully transferable options and warrants, which may significantly differ from the Company's stock option awards or warrant grants. These models also require four highly subjective assumptions, including future stock price volatility and expected time until exercise, which greatly affect the calculated values. Accordingly, management believes that these models do not necessarily provide a reliable single measure of the fair value of the Company's stock option awards. The valuation models are used to provide a reasonable estimate of fair value given the variables used.

Restoration and Environmental Obligations

Legal or constructive obligations associated with site restoration on the retirement of assets are recognized when they are incurred and when a reasonable estimate of the value of the obligation can be made. The Company has not commenced operations on its mining properties and the principal projects are in the exploration stage, however certain exploration activities have occurred that have given rise to a constructive obligation related to the reclamation of the site. As such, the Company has recognized an environmental rehabilitation provision for the projects. Due to the uncertainty around the settlement date and measurement of potential asset retirement obligations for the Company's projects, management considers the assumptions used to calculate the present value of such liabilities at each reporting period and updates the value recognized as required.

Contractual Commitments

The following table discloses, as of June 30, 2026, the Company's contractual obligations, including anticipated mineral property payments and work commitments. Under the terms of the Company's mineral property purchase agreements, mineral leases and the terms of the unpatented mineral claims held by it, the Company is required to make certain scheduled acquisition payments, incur certain levels of expenditures, make lease or advance royalty payments, make payments to government authorities and incur assessment work expenditures as summarized in the table below in order to maintain and preserve the Company's interest in the related mineral properties. If the Company is unable or unwilling to make any such payments or incur any such expenditures, it is likely that the Company would lose or forfeit its rights to acquire or hold the related mineral properties. The following table assumes that the Company retains the rights to all of its current mineral properties, but does not exercise any lease purchase or royalty buyout options.

The Company is committed under exploration and evaluation property option agreements to pay cash as outlined in the table below but could reduce or terminate the option agreements upon appropriate notice.

Off-balance sheet arrangements

The Company has no off-balance sheet arrangements.

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk of an unexpected loss if a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations and arises primarily from the Company's cash and cash equivalents and amounts receivable. The Company manages its credit risk relating to cash and cash equivalents by dealing only with highly-rated Canadian financial institutions. As at June 30, 2026, amounts receivable of \$160,316 was comprised of goods and services tax receivable. As a result, credit risk is considered insignificant.

Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will not be able to meet its financial obligations as they fall due. The Company manages liquidity risk by continuously monitoring actual and projected cash flows and matching the maturity profile of financial assets and liabilities. As at June 30, 2026, the Company had cash of \$42,384,571 to settle current liabilities of \$2,744,584.

Currency Risk

Foreign currency exchange risk is the risk that future cash flows, net income and comprehensive income will fluctuate as a result of changes in foreign exchange rates. As the Company's operations are conducted internationally, operations and capital activity may be transacted in currencies other than the functional currency of the entity party to the transaction.

The Company's objective in managing its foreign currency risk is to minimize its net exposures to foreign currency cash flows by obtaining most of its estimated annual U.S. cash requirements and holding the remaining currency in Canadian dollars. The Company monitors and forecasts the values of net foreign currency cash flow and consolidated statement of financial position exposures

and from time to time could authorize the use of derivative financial instruments such as forward foreign exchange contracts to economically hedge a portion of foreign currency fluctuations.

Commodity Price Risk

The Company is in the exploration stage and is not subject to commodity price risk.

RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Company's business, being the acquisition, exploration and development of mineral properties in the United States, is speculative and involves a high degree of risk. For a more comprehensive discussion of the risk factors that may affect the Company, its business operations and financial performance, refer to the risk disclosure under the heading "*Risk Factors*" contained in the Company's AIF for the year ended December 31, 2025, which is available electronically on SEDAR+ (www.sedarplus.ca) under the Company's issuer profile.

The Company believes that the following items represent significant areas of risk and uncertainty:

Cash Flows and Additional Funding Requirements

The Company has limited financial resources, no sources of operating cash flows and no assurances that sufficient funding will be available to continue to carry on its business and develop its mineral properties.

Industry

The Company is engaged in the exploration of mineral properties, an inherently risky business. There is no assurance that funds spent on the exploration and development of a mineral deposit will result in the discovery of an economic ore body. Most exploration projects do not result in the discovery of commercially mineable ore deposits.

Commodity Prices

The success of the Company's operations will be dependent in part upon the market price of mineral commodities. Mineral prices fluctuate widely and are affected by numerous factors beyond the control of the Company. The prices of mineral commodities have fluctuated widely in recent years and continue to be volatile as economies around the world continue to experience economic challenges, along with political changes and uncertainties. Current and future price declines could cause commercial production to be impracticable.

Competition

The mining industry is intensely competitive in all of its phases, and the Company competes with many companies possessing greater financial resources and technical facilities than itself with respect to the discovery and acquisition of interests in mineral properties, the recruitment and retention of qualified employees and other persons to carry out its mineral exploration activities. Competition in the mining industry could adversely affect the Company's prospects for mineral exploration in the future.

Foreign Political Risk

As of the date of this MD&A, the Company's material property is currently located in Alaska, and a substantial portion of the Company's business is exposed to various degrees of political, security, legal, economic, health and safety and other risks and uncertainties, including risks associated with operating in a jurisdiction that may have different cultural, economic and political environments than Canada. The Company's operations and investments may be affected by local political and economic developments, including expropriation, nationalization, invalidation of government orders, permits or agreements pertaining to property rights, political unrest, labour disputes, limitations on repatriation of earnings, limitations on mineral exports, limitations on foreign ownership, inability to obtain or delays in obtaining necessary mining permits, opposition to mining from local, environmental or other non-governmental organizations, government participation, royalties, duties, rates of exchange, high rates of inflation, price controls, exchange controls, currency fluctuations, taxation and changes in laws, regulations or policies as well as by-laws and policies of Canada affecting foreign trade, investment and taxation.

Changes in political leadership or other future political and economic conditions in the U.S. may result in the government adopting different policies with respect to foreign investment, taxation, development and ownership of mineral resources and the legality of mining generally. Any changes in such policies may result in changes in laws affecting ownership of assets, foreign investment, the ability to operate, mining exploration and development, taxation (including value added and withholding taxes), royalties, currency exchange rates, gold sales, environmental protection, labour relations, price controls, repatriation of income, and return of capital, which may have a material adverse effect on the financial performance of the Company. Such changes may also affect both the ability of the Company to undertake exploration and development activities in respect of future properties in the manner currently contemplated, as well as its ability to continue to explore, develop, and operate those properties to which it has rights relating to exploration, development, and operation. Future governments in the U.S. or in other jurisdictions in which the Company may operate in the future may adopt substantially different policies from those currently in effect.

Government Laws, Regulation & Permitting

Mining and exploration activities of the Company are subject to both domestic and foreign laws and regulations governing prospecting, development, production, taxes, labour standards, occupational health, mine safety, waste disposal, toxic substances, the environment and other matters. Although the Company believes that all exploration activities are currently carried out in

accordance with all applicable rules and regulations, no assurance can be given that new rules and regulations will not be enacted or that existing rules and regulations will not be applied in a manner which could limit or curtail production or development. Amendments to current laws and regulations governing the operations and activities of the Company or more stringent implementation thereof could have a substantial adverse impact on the Company.

The operations of the Company will require licenses and permits from various governmental authorities to carry out exploration and development at its projects. There can be no assurance that the Company will be able to obtain the necessary licenses and permits on acceptable terms, in a timely manner or at all. Any failure to comply with permits and applicable laws and regulations, even if inadvertent, could result in the interruption or closure of operations or material fines, penalties or other liabilities.

Title to Properties

Acquisition of rights to the exploration and evaluation properties is a very detailed and time-consuming process. Title to, and the area of, exploration and evaluation properties may be disputed. Although the Company has made reasonable efforts to investigate the title to all of the properties for which it holds mineral leases or licenses or in respect of which it has a right to earn an interest, the Company cannot give an assurance that title to such properties will not be challenged or impugned.

The Company has the right to earn an interest in certain of its properties. To earn its interest in each property, the Company is required to make certain cash payments and incur certain exploration expenditures. If the Company fails to make these payments and incur such expenditures, the Company may lose its right to such properties and forfeit any funds expended to such time.

Estimates of Mineral Resources

The mineral resource estimates used by the Company are estimates only and no assurance can be given that any particular level of recovery of minerals will in fact be realized or that an identified resource will ever qualify as a commercially mineable (or viable) deposit which can be legally or commercially exploited. In addition, the grade of mineralization ultimately mined may differ from that indicated by drilling results and such differences could be material.

Key Management

The success of the Company will be largely dependent upon the performance of its key officers, consultants and employees. Locating and developing mineral deposits depends on a number of factors, not the least of which is the technical skill of the exploration personnel involved. The success of the Company is largely dependent on the performance of its key individuals. Failure to retain key individuals or to attract or retain additional key individuals with necessary skills could have a materially adverse impact upon the Company's success.

Potential Shortage of Equipment and Supplies

We are dependent on various supplies and equipment to carry out our mining exploration and, if warranted, development operations. A shortage of such supplies, equipment, and parts could have a material adverse effect on our ability to carry out our operations and, therefore, limit or increase the cost of production.

Higher diesel prices in 2026 have increased drilling and exploration costs.

Volatility of Share Price

Market prices for shares of early-stage companies are often volatile. Factors such as announcements of mineral discoveries, financial results, and other factors could have a significant effect on the price of the Company's shares.

Foreign Currency Risk

A substantial portion of the Company's expenses and payables are now, and are expected to continue to be incurred in United States ("U.S.") currency. The Company's business will be subject to risks typical of an international business including, but not limited to, differing tax structures, regulations and restrictions and general foreign exchange rate volatility. Fluctuations in the exchange rate between the Canadian dollar and United States dollar may have a material effect on the Company's business, financial condition and results of operations and could result in downward price pressure for the Company's products in or losses from currency exchange rate fluctuations. The Company does not actively hedge against foreign currency fluctuations.

Conflict of Interest

Some of the Company's directors and officers are directors and officers of other natural resource or mining-related companies. These associations may give rise from time to time to conflicts of interest which will be subject to the procedures and remedies under the *Business Corporation Act (British Columbia)*. As a result of any such conflict, the Company may miss the opportunity to participate in certain transactions.

OUTLOOK

During the six-month period ended June 30, 2026, the Company closed a brokered private placement financing for total proceeds of Cdn\$49,999,950 through the sale of 38,461,500 Common Shares of the Company at a price of Cdn\$1.30 per Common Share with participation from institutional investors, including continued support from Eric Sprott. Management believes this financing strengthens the Company's ability to execute planned 2026 programs.

During the six-month period ended June 30, 2026, 4,468,750 Warrants at Cdn\$0.52 were exercised for proceeds of Cdn\$2,323,750, 1,426,250 Warrants at Cdn\$0.4307 were exercised for proceeds of Cdn\$614,286 and 500,000 Warrants at Cdn\$1.30 were exercised for proceeds of Cdn\$600,000.

Drilling resumed at the Golden Summit Project in February 2026 and management expects 2026 to be an active year, with infill, condemnation, and exploration drilling, as well as ongoing environmental baseline programs to support future permitting activities. These activities are expected to provide technical inputs for the PFS targeted for completion in 2027.

Management's principal 2026 initiatives at the Golden Summit Project are expected to include the following:

- Infill drilling to define higher-grade corridors and further derisk the mineral resource;
- Expanded metallurgical testing to optimize gold recovery and enhance project economics;
- Evaluation of multiple development strategies, including staged development, to maximize project viability and minimize initial capital expenditures;

- Geotechnical drilling and studies;
- Environmental baseline studies;
- Cultural baseline study; and
- Engineering studies in support of PFS planned to be completed in 2027.
